



Forest Program News

Our Forest Program has been going strong this spring, with multiple projects in the works, including new easements, interns, field work, and outreach.

New Easements:

We are excited for the next batch of 500-Year Forests to be introduced to our catalog! This spring our staff has visited five forests all over the Commonwealth whose owners are interested in our program. Three of these owners are taking the next steps towards protecting their forests, so be on the lookout for the announcement of new 500-Year Forests in Halifax, Amherst, and Albemarle Counties!

Interns:

We are happy to have Wednesday Hertzberg '26 and Alana Ellis '26 of Randolph College back for another summer as our forest program interns this year! They will be assisting Gabriel Quintero, our Forest Coordinator, with forest inventories, carbon storage assessments, invasive species removal, and educational outreach. Special thanks to Dr. Karin Warren and Dr. William Bare of Randolph College for assisting with administration, coordination, and lab equipment.

Field Work:

This spring is packed with field work to support our forest owners. In April, we completed an inventory of the Bieker 500-Year Forest, and supporting visits to four landowners interested in our program. In early May, we completed a monitoring visit to the Biasiolli 500-Year Forest, and later in the month we plan to conduct an inventory and carbon storage assessment of the Edmunds 500-Year Forest. Looking ahead to June, we have plans for an invasive removal project at the Bieker 500-Year Forest and an invasive prioritization survey at the Edgeworth 500-Year Forest.

Outreach:

We are continuously expanding our outreach into the community. This spring we have increased our connections with other lands trusts across the Commonwealth, held educational tables and walks, and increased our social media presence. Follow us on Instagram, Facebook, and BlueSky to learn bite-sized facts about Virginia's forests and keep up to date on future events – including our next Walk in the Woods and our partnership with the Lynchburg Hillcats!


